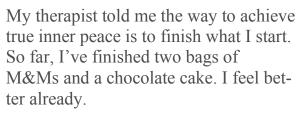

Neighborhood Scoop

A Collection of Contiguous Choice Cuisine AKA Favorite Neighboor Food

Chile Rellenos by Cindy Wade
1 can whole green chilies roasted (5-6 chilies)
2 cups shredded cheese (Mexican, Pepper or Monterey Jack)
5 or 6 Egg Roll wrappers (in the produce section)
1 – 2 cups oil for frying

Clean the chilies of any extra roasted skin.

Place 1 chili on egg roll wrapper, slice open length wise, remove any seeds.

Fill chili with cheese & wrap as instructed on egg roll package.

In frying pan add oil about 1/4 - 1/2 inch deep, heat to medium high.

Carefully add rolled chilies to pan, brown on both sides. Remove from pan, drain on paper towel. Serve Hot!

Low Carb Cinnamon Curritos Ingredients

- 1/2 Cup almond flour
- 2 Tablespoons coconut flour
- 1/4 Teaspoon baking powder
- 2 Teaspoons ground cinnamon, divided
- 1/8 Teaspoon salt
- 1/2 Cup unsweetened coconut milk
- 1 Tablespoon unsalted butter 3 Tablespoons granular sugar substitute (Xylitol), divided
- *1 large egg

Directions

- 1. Prepare a large skillet or deep fat fryer with 2-3 inches of oil. Heat to 350°F. In a small bowl combine the almond flour, coconut flour, baking powder, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and salt. Mix thoroughly and set aside.
- 2. In a small sauce pan bring the coconut milk, butter and 1 tablespoon xylitol to a boil. Remove from heat and add the flour mixture stirring until very thick and it forms a ball. Allow to cool for 5 minutes.
- 3. Once cool add 1 egg and mix until a very thick paste forms, about 1



minute. Drop by tablespoons 4-8 at a time into the fryer and fry until golden brown and crisp on the outside; about 3-4 minutes; rotating halfway through. Repeat until all of batter is used. It should make about 16 balls. Set aside on a paper towel once cooked.

In a blender pulse the remaining 2 tablespoons of xylitol with 1 teaspoon of cinnamon 1 -2 times, until xylitol granules are a little smaller. When each batch is finished roll in the xylitol-cinnamon mixture until evenly coated and set on a serving platter. Enjoy immediately or they may be kept at room temperature for 1 day. May also freeze for 3 months or reigerate for up to 1 week. 2 balls per serving.

Eggplant Parmesan by Teresa Beilfuss (low carb without bread!)

2 Large Eggplants

6 oz parmesan grated

10-12 oz mozzarella shredded

1-2 cups ricotta

2 Cans petite Diced tomatoes

2 cups spaghetti sauce (your choice)

Italian Seasoning 2 tsp or to taste

½ cup chicken broth

Extra Virgin Olive Oil

Salt

Pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease baking dish with EVOO or spray with cooking spray. Peel Eggplants and slice thinly coat in olive oil and lightly salt, set aside to marinate. Mix parm& ricotta with Italian seasoning. Mix spaghetti sauce with chicken broth and tomatoes. Spread spaghetti sauce mix on the bottom of baking dish. Begin layering eggplant and tomato mix with ricotta mixture on top and cover each section with Mozzarella. Cover dish with foil until bubbly then remove foil to lightly brown(5-10 min. Let cool for min 15 min (

10 Minute Veggie Soup *

Prep time is 15 minutes Makes 6 servings

Ingredients:

- 2 (20 ounce) cans of low sodium chicken broth
- 14.5 ounce can of diced tomatoes no salt added

becomes soft. Soup will then be ready to serve.

- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- ½ teaspoon onion powder
- 3/4 cup uncooked macaroni
- 3 cups frozen mixed vegetables (broccoli, cauliflower and carrot mix is recommended but not required)
- 1/3 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper

Directions:

Combine chicken brother, diced tomatoes, basil and onion powder.

Bring to a simmer and add pasta and frozen vegetables

Cook for six minutes and remove from heat

Pasta will not be cooked all the way through. Let coup sit for five minutes as the pasta

A recent column by Heloise, recommended that each home should have an extinguisher in the living area, the kitchen and the garage. Check the pin on each extinguisher to see if it is in the right place. If it is not, or the extinguisher is damaged in any way, get a new extinguisher. Next, make sure all extinguishers are at the right pressure. There is a gauge used to indicate that the needle is in the green "zone." If the needle isn't in the zone, place it. The SHVFD's Dottie Barrett has confirmed that their organization no longer performs extinguisher checks. You must take them to a place that is certified for this function. They will examine the extinguisher and refill

it. Many neighbors including the SHVFD go to Acme Fire on Wasatch Avenue.

Can we find your house if we have to?

Next time youdrive up to your place (especially at night) ask yourself if your house is easily identifiable. Are your house numbers posted in viewable spots?

Are they large enough to be seen from the street? Are the edges of the numbers sharp and clear? We've talked about this before but still noticed neighbors whose numbers are hidden or just not there at all. The EPSO and the SHVFD want to get to you quickly, so help them out by sprucing up your numbers.

PLAYHOUSE IN OUR AREA

Just outside Stratmoor Hills at Venetucci and Tenderfood Hill is a new structure for children. It is Little Sunshine's Playhouse and Preschool whose architecture is unique. The building opened in April 2014. When we finally got through security, we heard children laughing and crying as we sat in the lobby painted in soft colors with natural lighting. There are "kiddy cams" in each room enabling parents to look at or watch their children from their computers.

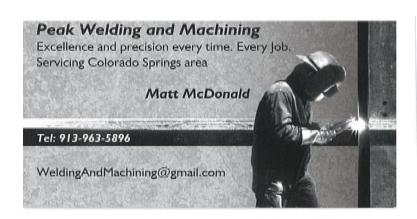
In an interview with Assistant Director Mary Kohlherns, we learned that the building will hold up to 100 children. Ages acceptable for enrollment are six weeks to five-and-a-half years of age. The management has designated two rooms for infants from six weeks to 12 months. After 12 months, children go into the general population. There is a large outdoor playground behind the Playhouse.

20 persons are employed at the Playhouse including directors, teachers, assistant teachers, and aides. The Playhouse and Preschool are a franchise; there are several in the Midwest and one planned for Gilbert, AZ.

Pricing is per the age group the child falls into: a) Infants and toddlers or b) two year olds or c) three and up. Children are fed only organic foods and parents have a say in what their children are fed.

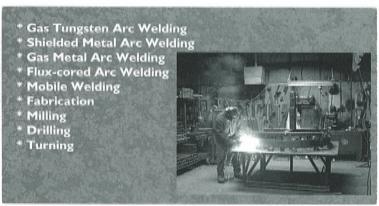


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
